A MESSAGE FROM RABBI NEIL



"The Sacred Struggle" by Rabbi Neil

One common theme seems to connect a notable minority of books in my personal library. From Dow Marmur's "Beyond Survival – Reflections on the Future of Judaism" to Scott Shay's "Getting Our Groove Back," Eugene Borowitz's "Renewing the Covenant," Jonathan Romain's "Renewing the Vision" or Steven Cohen and Keith Kahn-Harris' "Beyond Belonging," I have noticed that a subsection of the books I own reveal the authors' nervousness about the future of Judaism, and in the face of that nervousness, these authors suggest a wide variety of ways to ensure the Jewish future. This is not just a liberal thing – after all, the Chief Rabbi of the United Synagogues also once felt the need to

write a book called "Will We Have Jewish Grandchildren? – Jewish Continuity and How to Achieve It."

The theme for my High Holy Day sermons this year – The Sacred Struggle – has come from much wonderful discussion with Temple members over the last year. Jews don't believe and we don't submit – we wrestle and we struggle, which is why we're named Israel (meaning, "He Struggled with God") after an essential Biblical moment. In the past, members of the Jewish community used to collectively struggle about certain things given certain shared assumptions, but those assumptions no longer hold to be true (the Shattered Paradigms I spoke about last year). Now, though, we struggle not just with traditional matters like Jewish law, modes of spirituality, and appropriate liturgy, but also with other matters that reveal the potentially wondrous diversity in Jewish thought today.

Why do I say "potentially wondrous diversity?" In theory, diversity is a Jewish strength. We learn from those in our community with differing views from ours, we gain new perspectives, we grow - that's how Jewish community has always been... at least in theory. Sometimes, though, misunderstanding diversity has led to conflict – such a thing was at least one cause of the Second Temple's destruction two thousand years ago. The question of "What does a Temple stand for?" or, even more prescient, "What does our Temple stand for?" is an unbelievably complex, emotional one in the face of a rapidly-changing Jewish community, and there are appropriately widely diverse opinions. All Jews and all Jewish communities wrestle in different ways with whether our Judaism is universal or particularist, we struggle with balancing tradition and modernity, with religious and secular values, with authority and autonomy, with how to understand our personal and communal role in the world. I believe that wrestling is The Sacred Struggle that every community must openly embrace as it naturally changes with the times and tries to respect those who want to hold onto what once was while also honoring the people who want to explore what could be.

This year, during my High Holy Day sermons, I intend to share my perspective on that Sacred Struggle for our community, and during our Yom Kippur Dialogues and Study Session, I hope that you'll also share your thoughts so that together we can move into the New Year with a better understanding of our shared vision of what we stand for, and on how we act on that vision together.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT



The summer months have proven to be quite eventful on our TBS campus. After years of patching and skirting the issue, the roof over our Sanctuary failed us in a big way causing pronounced damage in the Library as well as the fover. New roofers were called in and unfortunately they found quite a mess up there – numerous layers of roofing material piled on top of roofing material on top of roofing material, all soaked through, hindering efforts to properly deal with the derivation of the leaks. Time for a new roof after 40 years of stopgap measures. On top of this disaster, on August 15th the soffit in the Sanctuary began pouring with water after another major rain storm. This time it was our 40 year old windows: the caulking had dried up leaving huge gaps around the windows, allowing the water from the storm to blow into the building, pool above the soffit and literally pour into our midst during Services. While all of this damage was being evaluated, it also became clear that the three air conditioning units were in dire need of attention, partially due to incorrect wiring

on one unit and a blown motor in another unit.

Those of us who attended Services during this time were witness to ladders, drop-clothes, buckets and other materials piled in our foyer. At first we thought we should clean up the mess every week but then we realized it was appropriate to share our reality with each other, with our congregation. It may not have been pretty but there is nothing like a dose of reality to drive the point home:

WE NEED YOUR HELP.

This is our home away from home. And if we intend for this beautiful building to be preserved for our children and grandchildren, it requires maintenance. The carpet hasn't been replaced in 24 years. The cushions in the pews have never been replaced. It is our Synagogue, worthy of our loving care. And it is up to each of us to shoulder that responsibility. I implore you to come forward with your ideas for grants or fundraising for our ailing building.

It has been a challenging year on many fronts. The building issues, while difficult, are trivial compared to the war in Gaza, the daily bombardment of rockets into Israel, the continued cruel imprisonment of the hostages. Many of us have family and friends in the line of fire and some of the stories they share are considerably different from the news reports we hear in the US.

We have been fortunate to avoid any serious anti-Semitic incidents here at TBS. However we must remain on our toes. We continue to have security at virtually all of our functions. We maintain close communication with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies to be informed of any potential threats. It is an unfortunate necessity in these times, but we remain vigilant and dedicated to the safety of our congregants.

As of this writing the High Holy Days are fast approaching. As usual, these events take a great deal of planning and preparation by the Rabbi, office staff and volunteers. A huge THANK YOU in advance to all of you who are putting in hours and hours of time to make the coming Holy Days meaningful for all of us.

5786 is almost here, with many challenges and opportunities. I am an optimist and I look forward to the continued thriving success of our congregation and in Jewish communities around the world.

Children learn and grow in many ways—through stories, through discovery, through the lessons we consciously teach. Yet one of the most profound teachers in their lives is community itself.

This is the miracle of community.

May this gathering be the first of many moments this year where our children feel—in heart and soul—the strength of belonging.

Her diverse portfolio included leadership development, synagogue mergers, and preservation heritage, with an additional specialty in the study of sacred space. Judith authored the URJ publication, "Rejoice in Your Handiwork: Sacred Space and Synagogue Architecture" and she was the guest scholar-in-residence at numerous Reform congregations discussing and teaching the evolution of American Reform synagogue architecture. After Judith's 18-year career at the URJ, she served as Executive Director of Adat Shalom, a large Reconstructionist congregation in Potomac, Maryland.

Judith was an avid rock climber and after her retirement became an adaptive sports advocate and rock climbing program organizer and instructor, providing climbing opportunities to people with physical disabilities. She organized and operated the Metro-DC chapter of Catalyst Sports, an adaptive climbing clinic in Alexandria, Va., the only such clinic in the metropolitan Washington D.C. area at that time. Judith and Randy are enjoying life in Santa Fe! She loves to knit and to walk her dog in the Santa Fe/El Dorado area. Judith volunteers at Kitchen Angels and Santa Fe's United Way Retired and is vitally interested in working for social action and social justice in her community and the world. with a foundation of not only cultural awareness, but the ability to truly think. I remember my mentor, Ellen Zieselman, told me, "If you're not asking questions, you're not doing it right." After I attended a college in California, I decided to focus on my passion for teaching. In this way, I am able to share what I know while expanding my knowledge in general. I was incredibly fortunate to grow up and return to a community that would always accept and support me, and I want to ensure that all our families at TBS have a chance for their students to invest in Judaism. Shabbat is a fundamental experience for many Jews around the world, and showing how connected we all are is powerful for the children. At the same time, however, I also love to teach about the similarities between other religions. Children are naturally inquisitive, and I am more than happy to discuss these big topics with them. Not only do I aspire to have our classes and Shabbat services be a celebration of TBS religion, I hope to instill curiosity and the desire to ask the "big questions." 


Intended to be accessible to all congregants, our High Holy Days appeal is the core opportunity for everyone to support Temple Beth Shalom.



On September 21 (Sunday at 2 p.m. on Zoom), we'll be discussing Yekl and The Imported Bridegroom, stories from Yiddish culture, by Abraham Cahan, first published in 1896. Among Cahan's many claims to fame, he was the founder of the The Forward, an excellent and important Jewish newspaper that is still published (though now in English, and online).

Then, on October 18 (Shabbat rather than our usual Sunday), we'll be joining the HaMakom book club, in person at HaMakom at 3 p.m, to discuss An Interrupted Life and Letters from

Westerbork, by Etty Hillesum. This meeting will take place in the afternoon after an 11 a.m. live presentation of The Etty Project, also at HaMakom. The Etty Project is a one-woman play based on the journals and letters of Etty Hillesum, "a young Jewish Dutch woman writing diaries in Amsterdam during the Second World War. In these diaries and later, her letters from Westerbork concentration camp, Etty bears witness to what it means to be human and commits herself to a radical choice: not to hate, even as she opens her heart to the horrors



unfolding around her. She wrestles to write the life she is living — her loves, her work, her humor, her spirituality, and her transformation. She was murdered in Auschwitz in 1943 at the age of 29."

The Cultural Roots of Christian Nationalism, and its Implications for American Jewry

Ron Duncan Hart

Ron Duncan Hart, Ph.D. is a cultural anthropologist, author, and filmmaker. When he heard the Unite the Right chant that "Jews will not replace us" in Charlotteville in 2017, he recognized the trope that he had heard for decades in the American South. During ethnographic research he had performed in a working-class neighborhood in Atlanta during the 1970's, he had heard preachers saying that the United States should be ruled by Christian leaders; feeling disenfranchised, and feeling loss of cultural influence, they were blaming the federal Jews, Blacks, and foreigners for corrupting (and government, undermining) their Christian way of life. Their arguments that Jews would replace Christians, take away the Bible, and outlaw the practice of Christianity are the kind of fear mongering that antisemitic forces have historically used against Jews. Across America, the cultural phenomenon of Christian nationalism emerged in thousands of neighborhoods like this in the last decades of the twentieth century. This talk will look at the development of the cultural roots of Christian nationalism and how its tenets relate to Jewish life.
